REPORT NO. 5 (2001-2002) Highway Department Annual Report – Dean Steingraber, Commissioner

Dean Steingraber reported that an increase in fuel prices, increase in asphalt prices, declining aggregate sources, an aging hot mix plant, difficult projects, and increase in health insurance costs are some of the challenges the Waupaca County Highway Department is facing. The Highway Department has accomplished a completion of projects, increase in work schedules, decrease in cost incident to labor rate, increase in equipment account, Adopt-A-Highway program, winter maintenance, interdepartment cooperation, and capital improvements program. AMEND CHAPTER 6 OF THE WAUPACA COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ADD SECTION 6.10 – CIVIL PROCESS SERVICE CHARGES

SECTION 6.10 – Civil Process Service Charge and Mileage rate charged of civil process service through the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department.

Wisconsin Statutes 814.705(1) allows for a County Board to establish a higher fee for collection by the Sheriff.

Waupaca County Board of Supervisors on October 29, 1996, Res. 44(1996) established the charge for process service to be \$30.00 per service and \$10.00 for each attempted service up to three (3) attempts.

The mileage rate charged for all civil process services shall be at the rate of 34.5 cents per mile.

EFFECTIVE DATE AND SEVERABILITY

This Ordinance shall be enacted and in full force and effective immediately upon adoption by the County Board.

RESOLUTION NO. 15 (2001-2002) Supporting a Prohibition of the Use of Cyanide in Wisconsin Mines

WHEREAS, mining companies are increasingly using cyanide to extract gold, silver, copper, zinc and other metals from metallic ore; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Crandon zinc-copper mine near the Wolf River would use as much as 18 to 20 tons of sodium cyanide each month during its operation; and Wisconsin is known to contain other gold deposits that would likely require cyanide for processing; and

WHEREAS, cyanide poses serious environmental risks – from transportation on our roadways, from storage and use at the proposed Crandon mine site, and from residuals disposed in waste dumps; and

WHEREAS, cyanide is highly toxic, with tiny traces fatal to human beings, fish and wildlife, and acts as a powerful solvent that can release other toxins; and

WHEREAS, cyanide has been the cause of recent environmental disasters at U.S. mines (in Colorado, Nevada, Montana, Idaho, California, South Dakota and South Carolina). and at many foreign mines (such as Romania, Guyana and Canada) resulting in massive fish kills and contaminated drinking water; and

WHEREAS, in 1998, Montana voters banned cyanide for mining, and in 2000, the Czech Republic did the same; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin must have the strongest mining laws in the nation in order to protect our abundance of clean water.

WHEREAS, the new company in charge of the Crandon project is the South African Mining Company, Billiton, Based in London.

WHEREAS, Billiton's Senior Manager of Corporate Affairs has said his company does not "like to be where we are not wanted."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County of Waupaca supports a prohibition on the use of cyanide reagents in Wisconsin mines and metallic ore processing facilities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Wisconsin State Legislature is urged to pass legislation to prohibit the use of cyanide in Wisconsin mines and metallic ore processing facilities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no company planning to use cyanide or other toxic chemicals in a mine near the pristine Wolf River will be "wanted" by communities in the Wolf River watershed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the State Representative and State Senator representing the County.
