Suprs. Sasse and Loughrin were excused and Supr. Steenbock was absent.

County Board Chair Brown made the opening statement that this meeting and all other meetings of this board are open to the public. Proper notice has been posted and given to the press, in accordance with Wisconsin Statutes so the citizenry may be aware of the time, place and agenda of this meeting.

Pledge of Allegiance was said by all followed by a moment of silence.

Supr. Lawrence moved and Supr. Flink seconded the motion to approve the agenda. Motion carried 24-0.

**PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ADOPTION OF THE  
TENTATIVE SUPERVISORY DISTRICT PLAN**

Tom Wilson, Waupaca County UW-Extension, reported that the Redistricting Committee had decided to retain the 27 supervisory districts that exist. Another goal of the committee was to identify districts that would have people who resided with more common interest to try to keep farming communities together, try to keep urban areas together, try to keep people who might have similar interests in a similar supervisory district. The third effort was to see what could be done to try to relate the previous supervisory districts 10 years ago to something comparable to that at this time. The maps reflect those districts and those boundaries with those types of criteria. The population in those districts range from about 1,870 people to as much as 1,939 which is within 2% of the the preferred number of people in a supervisory district which is 1,916. The specific detail on the boundaries by roads will have to be identified. At this point in time, the Committee has suggested that the maps do the best that we can to identify where that is. It will be possible to enlarge individual supervisory district maps to better see that area. Boundries will need to be geographical, such as a road or a river. Population is based on how many people live in Waupaca County total, not eligible voters.

County Board Chair Brown asked 3 times for comments or questions from the public, being none, Supr. Fleese moved and Supr. Rasmussen seconded the motion to close the public hearing. Motion carried 24-0.

Supr. Fleese moved and Supr. Flink seconded the motion to adopt the tentative supervisory district plan. Motion carried 24-0.

Supr. Lawrence reviewed the County Board tour agenda and reminded County Board members to sign up.
