## AMEND CHAPTER 3, SECTION 5 OF THE WAUPACA COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ADD: SECTION L. INFORMATION SYSTEM TECHNOLOGY REPLACEMENT PLAN

# L. <u>INFORMATION SYSTEM TECHNOLOGY REPLACEMENT PLAN</u>

## PROLOGUE

The Waupaca County Information Systems Department provides and supports many and various information technology resources for use by all Waupaca County departments to support their missions. The purpose of this policy is to set forth software and hardware replacement guidelines. The goal is to provide a cost effective manner for managing the County's information technology, provide accountability of technology costs and provide more flexibility in utilization of computer equipment.

#### OVERALL POLICY

All technology equipment, software, maintenance contracts, repair parts, etc. shall be purchased through Information Systems. Waupaca County Information Systems shall own all equipment and software purchased. The Information Systems Department staff shall determine the most effective placement of equipment. Information Systems reserves the right to bill a department for items that do not adhere to this policy.

This policy applies to all computer and data communications systems and refers to all hardware, data, software and associated communications networks owned and leased by Waupaca County, except for the following exemptions:

The law enforcement records system The law enforcement radio system The geographical information system The land records / vital records system / CAD The nursing home software The data resources software The global financial and records system The HVAC software

#### MICROCOMPUTER USAGE DESIGNATION CATEGORY

All microcomputers within the Information Systems inventory and in general use by staff and public will have one of the following designations applied: Comprehensive, Basic or Limited.

"Comprehensive" indicates a high-end, network ready computer, capable of performing an extensive variety of applications – including high-end applications and multimedia – within a graphical operating environment. Examples: GIS workstations, laptops

"Basic" indicates a mid-range, network ready computer, capable of performing a variety of select, standard applications – including adequate application and multimedia performance – within a graphical environment.

"Limited" indicates a low-end computer adequate for performing a few applications – ideally but not necessarily within a graphic operating environment. Example: Windows terminal devices

These designations can be reclassified as a computer ages.

## **REPLACEMENT PROCESS**

The Waupaca County Information Systems Department plans for the replacement of computer equipment on a schedule in keeping with the best practices of industry, currently three to five years. Systems may be updated prior to scheduled replacement if necessary to accommodate software releases/upgrades or to accommodate changes caused by federal or state needs.

In cases of limited funding to address all of the identifiable needs, priorities will be based in (1) number of computers available in the department, (2) usage, (3) critical nature of work.

The following schedule will be applied to all Waupaca County technology:

Network infrastructure hardware – 3-4 yrs Network servers – 3 -4 yrs Comprehensive microcomputer – 3-4 yrs Basic microcomputer - 4 yrs PDAs – 4 years Limited – when it becomes non-usable\* Printers – when it becomes non-usable\* Monitors - when it becomes non-usable\* Desktop operating systems – 5 yrs Server operating systems – 4 yrs Standard software – 5 yrs

\*Non-usable description means the device will no longer work anywhere in the County.

# EQUIPMENT ADDITIONS

Hardware additions must be requested to the Information Systems Committee during the budget process, requests due July 31st. The Information Systems Committee will review all requests for additional devices and will decide whether or not to include the device in the following years Information Systems budget.

#### REDEPLOYMENT PLAN

As existing technology is replaced, their designation will be appropriately downgraded and they will then be reallocated to less intensive use within the County until they eventually are disposed of by Information Services. Reallocation(s) should have the effect of removing the lowest-end machine from general staff and public use.

#### AMEND CHAPTER 7.07 OF THE WAUPACA COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES

# SUBJECT: WEIGHT RESTRICTION - County Trunk Highway "I" From USH 45 to the Shawano County Line

**WHEREAS**, Wisconsin Statutes 349.15(2), relative to the authority to modify weight limitations and classify highways, gives the County Highway Committee authority to designate all or parts of such highways maintained by them to be Class "B" highways for the purpose of putting into effect the weight limitations set forth in Section 348.16(2) (3); and

**WHEREAS**, the imposition of weight limits can be based on weakness of the roadbed due to deterioration or climatic conditions or other special conditions, and the potential for serious damage or destruction in the absence of such weight restrictions; and

**WHEREAS**, the Highway Committee and Highway Commissioner have reviewed and considered the implications of adopting an ordinance by submitting this recommended weight restriction to the County Board; and

**WHEREAS**, proper signing will be enacted in accordance with Wisconsin Statute 349.16 (2) and the authority in charge of maintenance may exempt vehicles carrying certain commodities specified by the authority, including but not limited to pumping septic or holding tanks, from the special weight limitations which are imposed under sub. (1) (a); and

**WHEREAS**, weight limitations on Class "B" highways Wisconsin Statute 348.16(2) state, pursuant to s.349.15 (3) "No person without a permit therefore shall operate any vehicle or combination of vehicles imposing wheel, axle, group of axles, or gross weight on the highway exceeding 60 per cent of the weights authorized in Wisconsin Statutes 348.15 (3)," and certain highways should be class "B" to insure them as safe traffic carriers, as so designated by the Highway Committee.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Waupaca County Board of Supervisors do hereby ordain as follows:

This special ordinance shall be in force for the Waupaca County Highway Department to designate and maintain CTH "I" from USH 45 to the Shawano County Line as a Class "B" highway for the purpose of establishing weight limitations to preserve the roadbed and insure this road as a safe traffic carrier, and signed in accordance with Wisconsin Statute 349.16 (1)(2)(3).

**CONDITIONS:** No person, whether operating under a permit or otherwise, shall operate a vehicle in violation of special weight limitations imposed by local authorities on the highway designated herein when signs have been erected as required by Wisconsin Statutes 349.16 (3). The compliance with regard to the modification, designation, and signing of the county trunk highway will be in accordance with applicable Wisconsin Statutes.

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage and publication and the signing as required by Wisconsin State Statutes.

## AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER NO. 34 Town of Mukwa, A-G to C-G 2006-495, Z-1-06

Part of Parcel #15-06-23, Z-1-06, Kevin M & Susan K. Bartel, in Sec. 6, Town of Mukwa for a Zoning Map Amendment from an A-G (General Agriculture) zone to a C-G (General Commercial) zone for the expansion of a commercial property.

An amendment to amend the Waupaca County Zoning Ordinance by changing the zoning classification of certain specified lands located in part of the SW ¼ of the NW ½ of Sec. 6, Town of Mukwa, lying along State Highway 54, Fire Number E-7310, Waupaca County, Wisconsin, on approximately 7 acres.

Subject matter of this ordinance having been duly referred to and considered by the Waupaca County Planning and Zoning Committee and public hearing having been held after the giving of requisite notice of said hearing and a recommendation thereon reported to the Board of Supervisors, Waupaca County, Wisconsin as required by Section 59.97 of the Wisconsin Statutes, said Board does ordain as follows:

- Section 1. The Zoning Map entitled Mukwa Township, Waupaca County is hereby amended by changing the zoning classification of the area shown on the attached map, which is made part of the ordinance from an A-G (General Agriculture) zone to a C-G (General Commercial) zone.
- Section 2. This ordinance shall be in force and effect in the Town of Mukwa upon filing with the County Clerk of Waupaca County a certified copy of a resolution of the Town Board of Supervisors of said town approving said ordinance or 40 days after the adoption of the ordinance by County Board, unless a certified copy of a resolution disapproving the amendment is filed within ten (10) days with the County Clerk within that time.
- Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in contravention of provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

# **RESOLUTION NO. 7 (2006-2007)**

#### SUBJECT: Oppose Assembly Substitute Amendment To Senate Bill 1 (2005)

**WHEREAS,** this Assembly Substitute Amendment to Senate Bill 1 would require a candidate for local public office (including all elected town, village, city, county, school district and town sanitary district officers) to file a *Statement of Economic Interests* within three days of filing nomination papers. Failure to file such a *Statement of Economic Interests* would disqualify the candidate from being placed on the ballot and could result in a forfeiture; and

WHEREAS, the *Statement of Economic Interests* (which currently applies to positions of higher elective State offices) requires candidates to file a comprehensive disclosure and listing of: investments, business activities, commercial customers, clients, tenants, business partners, real estate holdings, creditors etc.; and

WHEREAS, while the requirement of filing a *Statement of Economic Interests* makes sense for individuals pursing higher positions of elective office within State Government, extending this requirement to local public offices will only serve to further limit the number of individuals who may be interested in serving on their local County Board, Town Board or School Board.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Waupaca County Board of Supervisors hereby voices its opposition to the Assembly Substitute Amendment to Senate Bill 1 requiring a *Statement of Economic Interests* to be filed by candidates for local public offices and respectfully requests that this Amendment be removed from Senate Bill 1.

**NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED** that the Waupaca County Board of Supervisors authorizes the Health and Human Services Department create two new Information & Assistance-Intake/Access Workers on the organizational chart, Labor Grade Levels #8 and # 9 effective July 1, 2006.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Department will contract with independent providers for additional hours needed for customer assessments and services within the limited funding of the ADRC Grant.
